ABOUT THE PROJECT

Funded by the Environmental Protection Agency, this project will utilize the Center for Documentary Expression and Art's Jordan River exhibit and catalogue, ReAwakened Beauty: the Past, Present, and Future of the Jordan River to engage intermediate and high school students and communities adjoining the river in water quality issues directly affecting them. Outreach into schools and communities will include study of local issues related to the river, environmental literature, photography, writing, service learning, restoration efforts, and public forums that engage, educate, and empower students and residents to co-create projects and educational materials to improve water quality,

the viability of the watershed, and their community.

Content developed by the student-community partnership will be utilized by the Jordan River Commission though **smartphone technology** to bring educational information to the fingertips of thousands of Salt Lake County residents. Interpretive "stops" installed within a pilot area along the Jordan River Parkway Trail and

throughout the community can be accessed with a new mobile website developed for the watershed. These interpretive stops will link to educational information explaining the community's role in protecting the watershed. The mobile website will also contain a library of educational topics and will allow residents to self-report water quality or safety concerns.



People noticed that they didn't receive the Gazette in May and June. (Many people noticed that they did not receive their beloved 10% discount coupon for Sutherlands.) The explanation? No surprise here: lack of money. But, the Gazette has returned. An unexpected one-time grant from Salt Lake City, coupled with an increase in advertising rates, have made this possible

Despite its revival, the Gazette will be different. If revenues permit, you'll receive a four-page Gazette. Otherwise, most months, the Gazette will be a single-page newsletter, announcing the upcoming Council meeting, providing an agenda, as well as a list of our faithful advertisers, who help make it all possible.

Is this a diminished role for the Gazette? Maybe. But the Gazette has always had limitations: Not enough space to cover everything that deserves attention; printing and mailing deadlines that prevent timely coverage of important issues and events.

But diminishment in one realm is matched by the Gazette's enhanced importance in another. The Gazette will be a table of contents for the Fairpark Community's new website, *fairparkcommunity.org*. Together, the Gazette and fairparkcommunity.org will inform Fairpark residents about new issues, provide timely updates as these issues develop, and alert people when immediate action is needed.

Newsletters and websites are great tools. But these tools will never match the critical importance of your personal participation in Fairpark Community Council meetings and other public forums. Nothing, whether digital or ink, can equal the strength of the Fairpark resident who shows up – to learn about, and speak to, the issues that affect our community.
